## .... President's Message ....

The holiday season is almost upon us and we will be busy with all kinds of preparations. I wish you all a wonderful time! Just before this hectic time, I attended the

NYSUT Regional Conference in Woodbury. There were 3 other HHH members there — Mel Stern, Joan Vanecek, and Keith Bantz.

We had the opportunity to see and hear from NYSUT's new officers and were impressed with their knowledge and interest in Retirees. The first speaker was Matt Jacobs, the Suffolk Office Staff Director, who spoke about the attack on public schools. He said that it is basically motivated by economics — a way to make money. He pointed out that many NYSUT members didn't vote and when we don't vote those forces feel we don't care, so they don't have to care about us.

Lena Ackerman, NYSUT's Asst. General Council, addressed the threat against Tenure. Tenure does not provide a permanent job, but gives teachers and other state, municipal, private, and other union members, protection from arbitrary dismissal through the right of due process. The Constitutional Convention in 2017 poses a threat to tenure. We must be vigilant.

Kyle Belokopitsky, NYSUT's Legislative Rep, spoke about the increasing pressure on children and teachers from the new testing. Testing is supposed to improve instruction, not evaluate teachers! There is a new bill, sponsored by Congressman Gibson, #HR4172, which would put testing back to Grades 4 and 8 and not Grade 3, which he urged us to support. And did you know that Charter Schools only have 5 years before they must apply to renew their charters?

The last speaker was Karen Magee, NYSUT President. She is a resident of Westchester Co. and long time union supporter. She spoke about NYSUT's ongoing legal actions and upcoming court dates. She also emphasized the importance of retiree support for the union's activities and the in-service teachers and recognized our long history of activism. Three retirees with 40 or more years of service were given an award.

## CORTLI Luncheon, 2014

On a day in October, CORTLI (Coalition of Retired Teachers of Long Island) held its luncheon at the Crest Hollow Country Club. The room was filled with hungry educators waiting to learn about the state of NY State education. By the end of the afternoon, we were happy that we had worked and retired from the State of NY.

Roger Tilles, who is currently a member of the NY Board of Regents representing the 10th Judicial District Nassau and Suffolk counties, was the guest speaker. His interesting and varied professional life included involvement with educational departments in Michigan as well as NY. He helped develop the new standards in NY State and would like the Regents to adjust and correct some outcomes that arose with the rollout. Some of the issues that are being discussed are pre-k funding for everyone, new rules for English learners, and multiple pathways to graduation.

Mr. Tilles shared his personal and professional life with us as well as giving us a glimpse into the politics of NY and how the education department works.

After a lovely lunch, we heard from David Keefe, the retired teachers representative of the Board of Trustees of NY State (NYSTRS). Mr. Keefe shared a great deal of information on the solvency of the NY retirement system. There are more than \$106 billion in assets with a return of about 18.9%. Since last July, \$6.3 billion was paid to retired teachers with about 82% of it going to addresses in NY State, adding to the economic engine of the state. At this time, there is no economic danger to our pensions. He spent some time discussing the political ramifications.

Mr. Keefe was named NYSUT's Retiree Member of the Year for 2014. It was easy to see why. He is an intelligent, knowledgeable representative for NY State Retired Teachers.

The day was filled with socializing, lunching, and stimulating our brains.

# Xnow Your Benefits Dick Lee, Welfare Trust Fund Administrator

#### "Your Pension - Is it Safe?"

Probably the most important benefit we have as retired teachers is our pension. At the AFT convention last summer, AFT President Randi Weingarten noted that 80% of the public sector have pensions, while only 8% of the private sector have this valuable benefit. She warned the delegates to "stop talking about your pensions" because other workers are jealous and we don't want to initiate an effort to strip us of this generous benefit.

The New York State Teachers' Retirement System is the most stable and well-funded pension plan in the nation. Through good management and diversified investments, the NYSTRS currently has 108 billion dollars in assets and, as of June 30, 2014, has paid out 6.3 billion dollars in pensions. The New York State Constitution guarantees that our "benefits shall not be diminished nor impaired". They may not be unilaterally reduced, taxed or negatively changed. However, in 2017 there will be an automatic call for a Constitutional Convention. If the electorate votes to hold this Convention, our pension guarantees could be put at risk. Of the 34 states without a Constitutional Guarantee, none of them, except Rhode Island, have reduced benefits, although some of them have eliminated COLA's.


Our pension is called a defined benefit plan as opposed to a defined contribution plan where workers contribute funds, in an IRA, to help finance their pensions. If New York State adopts a Tier 7 as defined contribution plan, our benefits will still be an obligation of the State, but more pressure will be put on the legislation to reduce that obligation.

The forces to reduce our pension benefits are well funded and active in every state. Our voice is financed through your VOTE/COPE contributions and NYSUT, AFT and NEA legislative lobbyists. 
